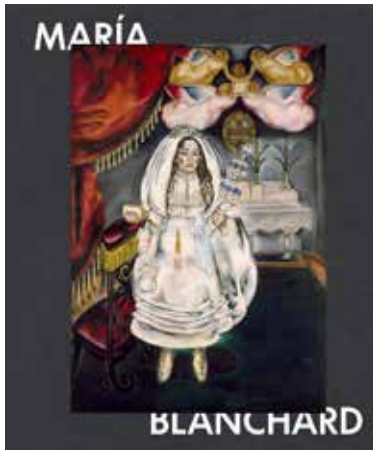

Maria Blanchard

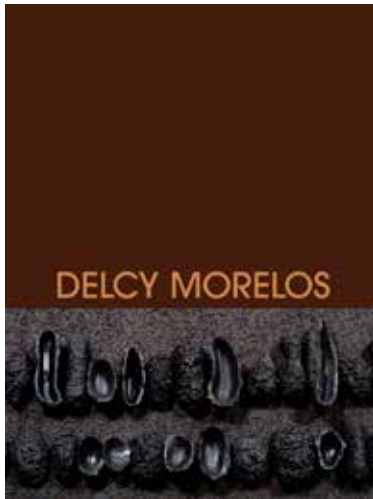

These aspects are reinforced by a meticulous technical mastery and a keen interest in the history and tradition of European painting.

Morelos's immersive installations aim to cultivate moments of connection with what she describes as the "intimate humidity of the Earth." This monograph, the first to be published in the United States, situates the Bogotá-based artist's practice within a broader, more global history of Land art and abstraction. It also examines the aesthetic and environmental considerations of the natural materials used in her Dia commission as well as their unique sensory, spatial, and phenomenological impact on the viewer.

The book will uncover the fascinating art-historical grounding of the commission through an introduction by Alexis Lowry, Dia curator. This overview will be supplemented by a meditation on peat, a singular and controversial material in Land art, by curator Camila Marambio and University of Queensland biology professor Renee Rossini, as well as an essay on scent and sculpture by Oswaldo Macía. The book will also feature a statement by the artist herself and a lively conversation between Morelos and the Chilean artist and poet Cecilia Vicuña. In a further exploration of one of Morelos's central creative and intellectual inspirations—Indigenous narratives about land and soil—this volume will publish for the first time a special section of stories from four communities—Barasana, Uitoto N+ode, and Yucuna—based in the Amazonian lands more commonly known as Colombia.

Atlas

A cartography composed of images and texts, arranged in the form of parallel essays: a whimsical set of illustrations of botany, landscape, nature, and poetry, accompanied by essays signed by some of Jan's distinguished colleagues in his career (Estrella de Diego, Patricia Sloane, Olivier Debroise, Issa María Benítez, Antonio Saborit, Cuauhtémoc Medina, Alejandro Hernández, Javier Barreiro Cavestany, José Luis Barrios). Also included are short texts in which Hendrix reflects on his artistic practice and an introduction by Maco Sánchez, editor of this publication, the result of a reading of the artist's extensive archive.

Journey to the Center

Cristina de Middel develops images that encourage reflection in the viewer. Her photographic essay “Journey to the Center”, which investigates phenomena related to the migration route through Mexico, has an atmosphere and symbolism inspired by Jules Verne’s famous novel “Journey to the Center of the Earth”.

With a language that combines straight documentary photography with constructed images and archival material, the narrative becomes multi-layered.

The migratory route through Central America is portrayed as a heroic and daring journey. Mexico, the setting for this adventure, is presented as the fascinating and extreme country that it is.

Cristina de Middel has been travelling for years with migrants on the train they call “the beast”, interviewing sicarios (hired killers), talking for hours with “coyotes” (clandestine smugglers) and police officers. By combining her own photographs with objects found in the desert and archive footage, she creates a multi-layered narrative.

The starting point is Tapachula, the Southern border of Mexico with Guatemala, and the journey ends in Felicity, a small town in California that is the officially “Center of the World”. This epic journey is punctuated by the accounts of three migrants recounting their terrible journey and commentary by the artist. An afterword by Mexican journalist, Pedro Anza, illuminates the issues at stake and the human consequences of the United States’ obsession with closing its borders.

Spanish photographer David Jimenez skillfully captures the essence of time, space, and emotion through his lens.

In the ROMA project, the transformative power of time and its ability to generate new meanings becomes visible, evoked through fragmented and incomplete forms that create a fictional space of combinatorial nature. Space, both real and imagined, is treated as a stage for the traces of time.

On The Geography of Green [&]

An info-photographic exploration of territory in the 21st century through Cloud Data

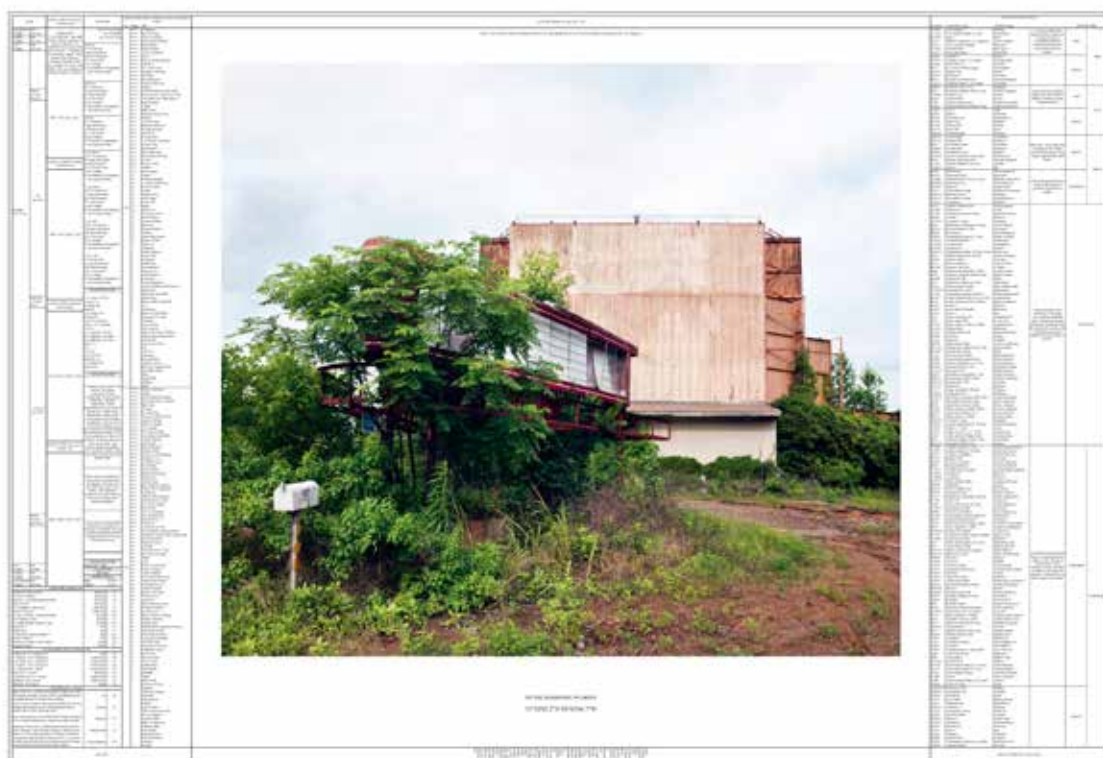
International artist, Linarejo Moreno, has won countless awards for her photographic and installation work, including an Ankaria Photo International Prize for 21st Century Photography for her “On the Geography of Green” series.

This companion piece to acclaimed exhibitions of the “On The Geography” project includes 31 “info-photographic” plates presented as striking triptychs.

Appealing to readers interested in innovative artistic approaches, offering them a multidimensional exploration of the landscape by combining artistic expression with sociological and technical analysis.

In the original series *On the Geography of Green*, carried out between 2016–2022, in abandoned drive-in theaters of Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana, Moreno explores landscape from a decolonized, gender-informed perspective. The book includes the first sketches on the original Humboldt plates that inspired the project, as well as 10 other plates, where the methodology is applied to other site-specific contexts and issues; *On the Geography of Red* (a study of Spanish museum collections from a gender perspective), *On the Geography of the River* and *On the Geography of Chutculucene* (studies on the production of knowledge and capital in the landscape from a post humanist perspective).

Echoing methodologies first used by early explorers of the American continent such as Alexandre Von Humboldt, Moreno juxtaposes striking imagery and data in order to introduce a critical view of the locations explored. The result is a novel book of photography that explores the canonical identity of the landscape to sublime effect, as well as presenting a sociological and technical study of the places explored.

The volume showcases all the painter's most important works and Masayo Nonaka's illuminating text offers a unique insight into the life and work of Remedios Varo.

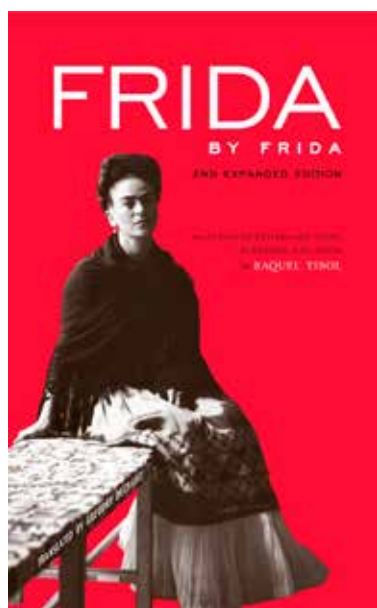
She is acclaimed as one of the most talented women surrealists of the 20th century.

Born and raised in Spain, Remedios Varo (1908–1963) received her first training in Madrid, before fleeing the Spanish civil war to join surrealist circles in Paris. At the outbreak of World War II, she was forced to take refuge in Mexico, where she remained until her untimely death in 1963.

Known as one of the three brujas (witches) active in the Mexico City art milieu, Varo shared an interest in esotericism with fellow painter Leonora Carrington and a range of interests in science, philosophy, and the literature of German Romanticism with the photographer Kati Horna.

For some ten years before her death, she devoted herself to creating an extraordinary dreamlike oeuvre, on the threshold between mysticism and the modern mind.

Frida by Frida **3rd Edition**

An appealing book about Frida, by Frida, providing an original, fascinating insight into her life, thoughts, and feelings.

Reprinted in hardback with a beautiful new cover.

Frida Kahlo, the writer? Art critic Raquel Tibol gathers letters, poems, notes, protests, confessions, brief messages, and longer texts written by Kahlo to her friends, lovers and others.

In her writings, Kahlo employs, in Tibol's words, an "unreserved, imaginative language, heart and intimacy laid bare," that reveals her taste for neologisms, colloquial turns and the crossing of linguistic boundaries. The freedom of her language is a path towards sincerity, the origin of Kahlo's pictorial universe, with its recurring motifs: the bus accident that left the artist physically maimed at the age of 18; her anguished and demanding adolescent passion for Alejandro Gómez Arias; her complex and fascinating relationship with Diego Rivera; her illness as destiny; her political engagements; and her uncompromising quest for liberty. Here the reader will find Kahlo "swinging back and forth between sincerity and manipulation, self-complacency and self-flagellation, with her insatiable need for affection, her erotic upheavals, her touches of humor, setting no limits for herself, with a capacity for self-analysis and a deep humility." By gathering this material, until now scattered in archives and various published sources, Tibol offers us "a tacit autobiography and the placement of Frida within the intimate, confessional literature of the twentieth century in Mexico." This is a Frida Kahlo far removed from the distorted image so often found in films, plays and supposedly serious writings and studies.

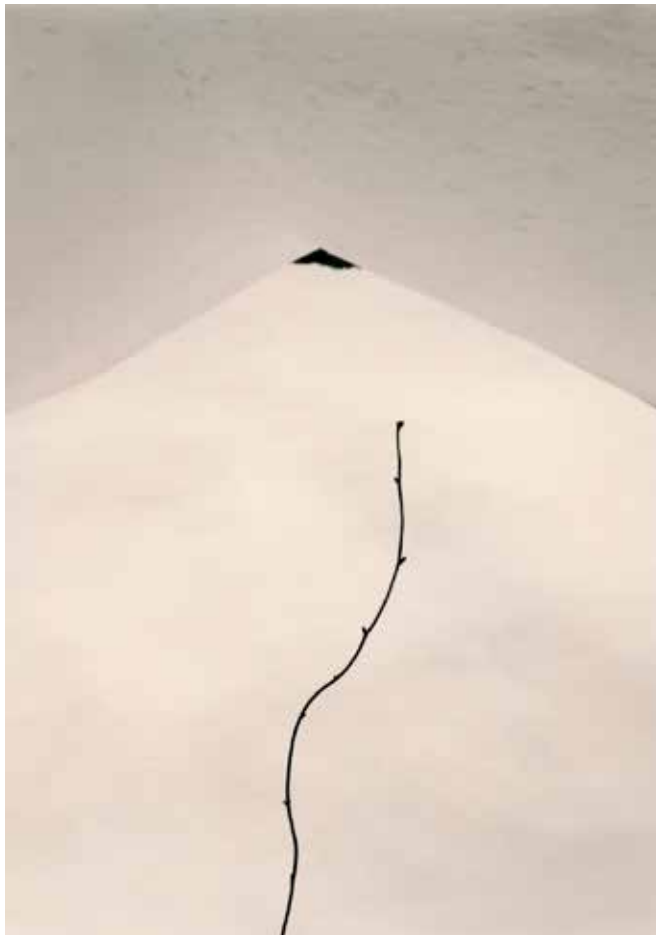

Omen. Phantasmagoria at the Farm Security Administration Archive 1935-19

“Omen” reexamines the Farm Security Administration’s photographic archive, revealing a lesser-known narrative that challenges traditional views of American history.

This book’s visual sequence breaks norms, creatively cropping images from the Farm Security Administration archives (1935-1944) at the New York Public Library.

Lucy Ives, the acclaimed American writer and poet, skilfully penned Omen’s captivating text. Ives has firmly established herself as a leading voice in the contemporary literary world, with numerous critically acclaimed publications to her name.

Chasing the ghost, the traces of oblivion, and the echoes of what was and no longer is, the book “Omen” is a revision and reframing of a fraction of the photographic archive of the Farm Security Administration (1935- 1944), hosted at the New York Public Library. That program was one of the milestones of modern documentary photography, instrumental in constructing a hegemonic narrative; one mainly about triumph against adversity, division, and catastrophe in the recent history of the United States.

But by gazing over that monumental set of images; by scrutinizing the corners of the pictures, the backgrounds and details; by examining the secondary characters; in what should not be there and what appears by chance, accident or error, it is possible to discover a different narrative, one that is thicker, murkier, more troubled, complex, contemporary and contradictory. Both a shatter and an apex: a premonition of the genealogical continuity of the many (tumultuous, visible, and invisible, thunderous, and silent) systemic violences that make up the face of American society.

A book that serves as a mirror for the distressing reality of the United States these days, and, at the same time, as a device for reflection on the way historical and documentary photography is read and understood.

Pablo Ortiz Monasterio & Mauricio Toro-Goya

Procesión 1973-2023

Commemorating the 50th year since the 1973 Civil-Military Coup in Chile, spearheaded by Augusto Pinochet, Chilean photographer Toro-Goya delves deeply into the harrowing subject of the Forced Disappearances that occurred between 1973 and 1990.

In this piece, characters grapple with the agonizing potential of discovering their vanished loved ones through a fictional narrative. A tangible tension intertwines the narrative and documentary elements, creating a visually compelling exploration of historical trauma in “Procesión.” Baroque stylistic techniques are employed, a style Toro-Goya dubs as “Baroque Documentarism”.

The book appeals to those interested in the socio-political dynamics of that era and resonates profoundly with audiences concerned about human rights and social justice.

For decades, military forces pursued, tortured, and hid those who stood against the Pinochet regime. Currently, about 1500 individuals remain unaccounted for in Chile, with their families persistently seeking answers. “Procesión” showcases a meticulously curated visual narrative by Toro-Goya, in partnership with the Association of Relatives of Disappeared Detainees from La Serena, Chile.

This work, dedicated to the memory of the vanished, stands as a poignant historical testament. The representative body transforms into a symbolic reality, bridging the memory voids for those in ceaseless pursuit.

Frida Kahlo Her Photos

Due to its incredible worldwide popularity RM offers a reprint of Frida Kahlo Her Photos.

This formidable collection, hidden for more than half a century, allows us to delve into the lives of Frida Kahlo and Diego Rivera.

This collection of photographic images is a treasure trove that reveals the tastes and interests of the famous couple.

When Frida Kahlo died, Diego Rivera, Frida's husband, ex-husband and widower, asked the poet Carlos Pellicer to turn the Casa Azul into a museum so that the people of Mexico could visit it and admire the artist's work. Pellicer selected Frida's paintings that were in the house, as well as some drawings, photos, books and ceramics. The rest of the objects, clothes, documents, drawings, letters and more than six thousand photographs that Frida collected during her lifetime were kept in storage. This collection of photographic images reveals the tastes and interests of the famous couple, not only in what the images say but also in the annotations in the margins and allows for speculation about their phobias and attractions; it is even possible to document their family origins. Photography was always present for Frida; her father Guillermo Kahlo was one of the great photographers of early 20th century Mexico. She kept some of his images of colonial architecture and several self-portraits. In Frida's collection there is a list of great photographers: Man Ray, Brassai, Martin Munkacsy, Pierre Verger, George Hurrel, Tina Modotti, Edward Weston, Manuel and Lola Álvarez Edward Weston, Manuel and Lola Álvarez Bravo, Gisèle Freund and many others, including Frida Kahlo herself. It is likely that she took several of the photos in the collection, although we are only certain of the ones she signed in 1929.
