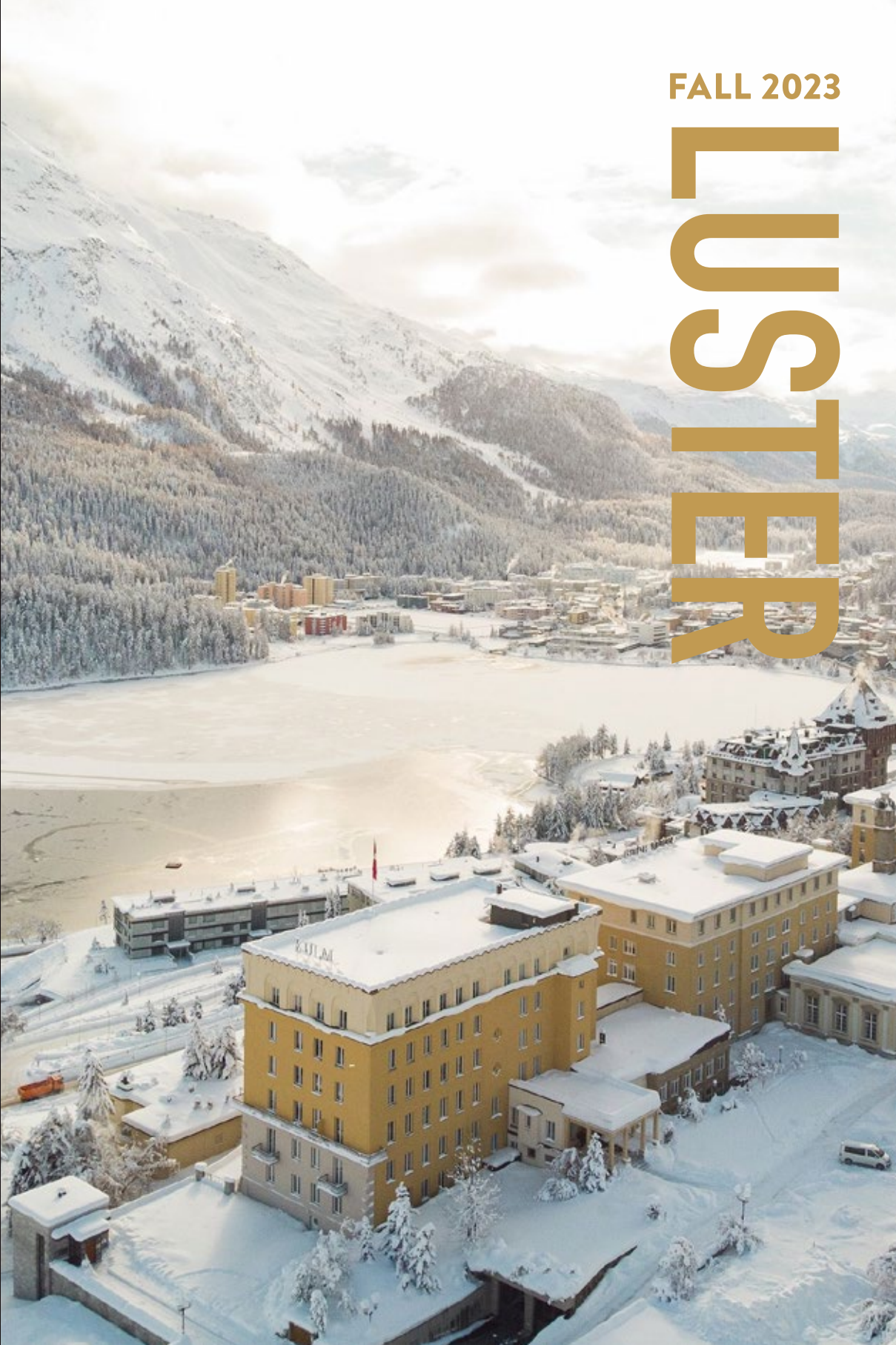


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CLARIDGE'S

LONDON, UNITED KINGDOM

London has its fair share of impeccable historic buildings and grand hotels, although none it can be said to compete with the landmark Mayfair hotel, Claridge's, located in London's most prestigious and expensive borough. It's one of the best historic, five-star hotels in the world, unrivalled for its combination of timeless elegance, discreet luxury and near-flawless service delivered by confident and well-trained staff at the top of their game.

Gliding through the revolving doors and strolling across that polished Art Deco tiled floor to the sound of a tinkling live piano feels like the ultimate luxury and yet, somehow, it feels homely. In the glamorous lobby, a vast chandelier tops a scene plucked from a film set, filled with big, statement bouquets from nearby McQueen Flowers.

It's no surprise Claridge's has become a home-from-home for Hollywood stars, dignitaries, and royalty past and present. Queen Victoria and Prince Albert visited in the 1850s, Winston Churchill stayed after his election defeat in 1945, when suite 212 was declared Yugoslavian territory so that Crown Prince Alexander II could be born on his own country's soil. In the 1950s, actors and actresses Cary Grant, Katharine Hepburn, Audrey Hepburn, Yul Brynner, Ring Lardner and Spencer Tracy – who said he'd rather go to Claridge's than to heaven when he dies – were all guests.

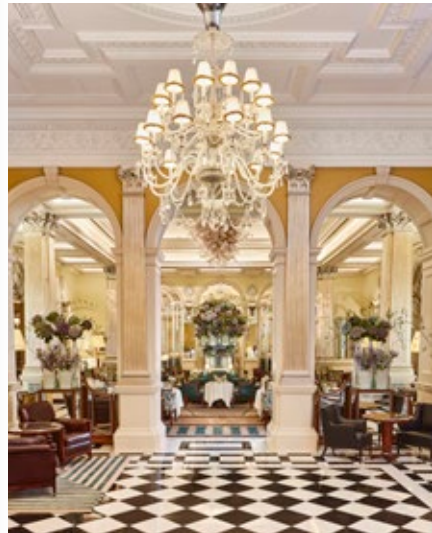
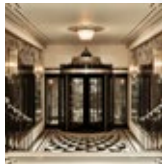
In 2000, a new generation of creatives call Claridge's home: Kate Stone celebrates her 10th birthday here, Jack Jagger and Luke Guinness describe the hotel as their ultimate treat while designer Diane von Furstenberg launches her room and suite as part of her first interior project.

Setting eyes on the magnificent red brick Art Deco masterpiece building it's hard to imagine it started life as a single house. It was originally founded as the Mirav's Hotel in 1862 by a man called James Mirav's, who provided monthly accommodation for wealthy visitors to London. As the success of Mirav's grew, additional houses in the row were bought and combined into the grand building we know today. While Mirav's was thriving, William and Marianne Claridge were running their successful hotel on Brook Street, eventually buying Mirav's Hotel in 1894 and combining the two properties. They were avidly collecting art known as "Claridge's late Mirav's", until 1895 when it became simply Claridge's.

The Claridge's we see today is rooted in the 1930s. It was remodelled in the 1930s based on archival photos that reflect the Art Deco style of a nod to the hotel's reputation as a haven of hedonistic luxury and glamour for flappers and jazz cats at the time who danced the Charleston and sipped cocktails to the sound of George Gershwin in the hotel's ballroom. Even after a recent spectacular makeover five years in the making that went ahead during the 2020 lockdown, it retains its old-school glamour.

— During World War II, the hotel was requisitioned by the British government and used as a military headquarters. Rumor has it that secret tunnels were built under the hotel to provide a quick escape route in case of an enemy attack.



GRAND HOTEL VILLA SERBELLONI

LAKE COMO, ITALY

Locations don't get much better than at Italy's longest family-run hotel, the opulent Grand Hotel Villa Serbelloni set on the water's edge of Lake Como. The area's grandest and most storied hotel, a haven away from the busy medieval village of Bellagio where its located, whose attractive cobbled streets lined with boutiques and restaurants, heave in summer.

A slow walk through the ever-scented Italian-style gardens filled with Mediterranean and subtropical plants, onto the sweeping terrace is an otherworldly experience, as you take in the view across the knee-shiny lake over to the lush peak of Monte Crocione in the Italian Prealps.

Other villas set on Lake Como have their history and charm, but it is Grand Hotel Villa Serbelloni that attracts the attention of design enthusiasts for its stunning architecture, and gastronomy with its Michelin-star restaurant. Not to mention a string of illustrious guests over the years.

Starting in the 1950s, in fact, the big political players like British Prime Minister Winston Churchill, Franklin D Roosevelt, and President Kennedy, who stayed in June 1963 accompanied by an entourage of staff including an escort of several bodyguards and greeted by a crowd of enthusiastic locals, and celebrities of the day such as the actress Mary Pickford, Clark Gable and later, Al Pacino, who filmed scenes for the 1977 film *Bullseye*.

Everything about the Grand Hotel Villa Serbelloni is opulent: it's all marble columns, Murano chandeliers, gilded frames, temples, puffs, fountains, and Pompeian arches. There's even a French-style period wall coverings, antique Persian carpets, crystal chandeliers from Murano, marble staircases, and trompe l'oeil decorations.

The Neoclassical-style building it's set within was built by Count Franzoni from Bergamo, Milan, in 1850, originally as a luxurious holiday villa for his wife, Countess Franzoni. Twenty years later, they extended it and opened it as the Grand Hotel Bellagio. It was an instant success, attracting wealthy guests from all over the world, impressed by its intricate mix of Empire, Neoclassical and Art Nouveau styles.

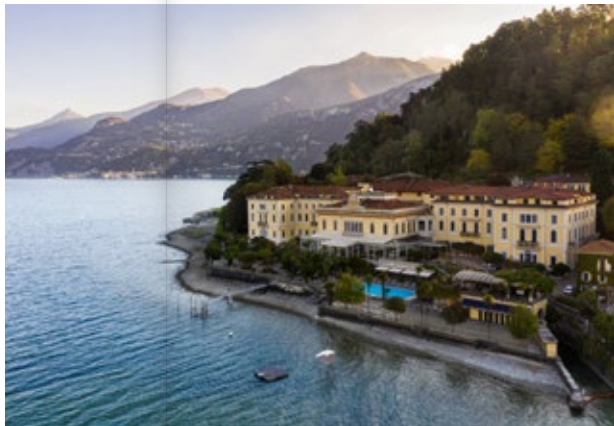
It was sold in 1918 to a man called Arturo Bacher, grandson of a Swiss entrepreneur and luxury hotel pioneer Franz Joseph Bacher, who continued its success. The villa is still run by the Bacher family, today, who work as a team

— Hotel Villa Serbelloni has a secret garden hidden from the public eye that features breathtaking views of the lake and surrounding mountains, providing peaceful and serene escape for guests seeking solitude.

In maintaining the charm, traditions, and classic style their ancestors started more than a century ago, now combined with modern facilities like two pools, a spa, and tennis and squash courts and a Michelin-starred restaurant, it still manages to retain a magical feeling of nostalgia.

"It is a real museum," says Daria Bacher, who remains the driving force behind the design of the villa and the creative eye behind the decor. "You can find a piano played by Franz Liszt in one room and a small table where Winston Churchill had breakfast in the other. Maybe there is too much stuff, but we like it, and in fact, this villa was not conceived to be minimal."

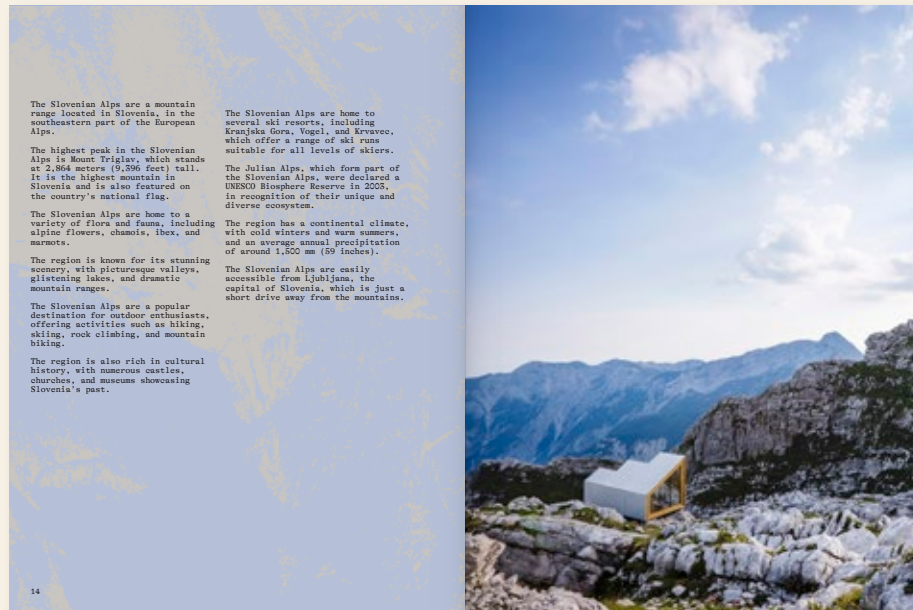

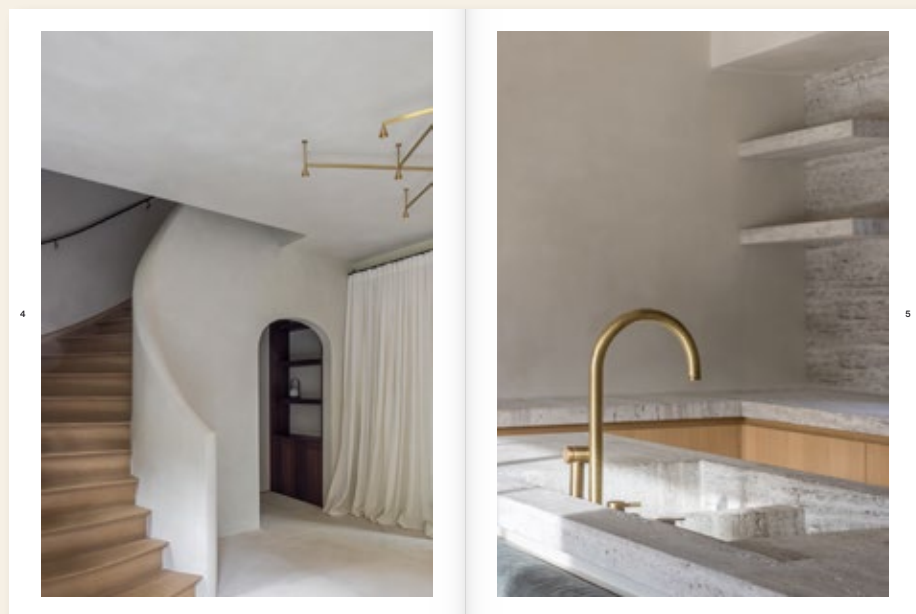

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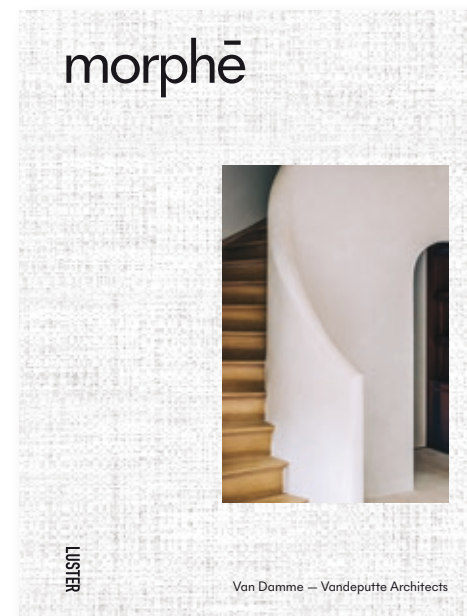

Five years ago, Hannes Van Damme and Benoît Vandeputte founded the **architectural firm Van Damme – Vandeputte**. Today, they can already look back on an impressive portfolio with a wide range of architectural projects: new residential constructions tailored to the client's needs, sustainable and high-quality renovations, interior design with special detailing, offices and corporate sites built with, among other things, great attention to the integration into the surroundings, and restorations of (protected) heritage sites. A provisional highlight is the move of their office to a beautifully renovated historic building in Izegem.

In this classy coffee-table book, compiled and designed with the greatest care, Van Damme – Vandeputte not only present a selection of architectural creations, but also shed light on the meaningful aspects of the process and philosophy behind their oeuvre. The book consists of 3 parts: in 'conversation & inspiration', the architects are interviewed about their architecture and what inspires them, and photos of these sources of inspiration are included. In part 2, 'works', 15 projects are extensively presented in beautiful images by Cafeine. Finally, 'looking ahead' is devoted to ongoing and currently unfinished projects, with renders and sketches. This unique book is like an extension of the architectural oeuvre of Van Damme – Vandeputte, and exemplifies the passion and dedication with which the architectural firm realises each of its projects.

Katherine Ennekens has a mission: to ensure that the still intact old shop interiors in Belgium are preserved for the future. Unfortunately, there are few of these beautiful examples of craftsmanship left today. To map and draw attention to these remaining heritage gems, Katherine published the book *Intérieurs de magasins le passé au présent* in 2014. Of the 40 authentic interiors she presented there, many have since been lost: it shows how fragile this heritage is, and thus how important it is to treat it with care.

That is why Katherine Ennekens now brings this second book, hoping that a better fate awaits her 40 'new' old shops. All these interiors are located in Belgium, are built on site, older than 50 years and exceptionally well preserved. The most diverse types of shops are featured, spread throughout the country: from a tobacco store in Antwerp to a poulterer in Sint-Truiden, from an optician in Charleroi to a candy store in Bruges, from a cheese shop in Brussels to a shoe store in Verviers. Some are still open, some were given a new use, some stand empty behind the closed shutters. Photographer Bart Kiggen captured them all for this book and for posterity. And, who knows, to inspire (young) shopkeepers to start a business in an authentic interior and thus help preserve the charm of a village or town.

Completed in 2009 and standing 80 stories amidst the city's tallest buildings, this tastefully modern building is a refreshing break in a skyline crowded with post-modern skyscrapers. Designed by Jeanne Gang, the wave-patterned building houses the 18-story Radisson Blu and scores of private residences that benefit from the building's thoughtfully elongated terraces with Lake Michigan views.

One look at these shiny metal structures and it's easy to spot Frank Gehry's handiwork. Both opened to the public in 2004 as part of the expansive Millennium Park development project, which reimagined a swath of rail yards and parking lots as a new "front yard" to the city. Come summertime, Pritzker Pavilion hosts live music most evenings, while the BP Bridge connects crowds to the sprawling Maggie Daley Park.
