


IS IT SAFE TO HAVE PLANTS IN THE BEDROOM?

There is an ongoing debate about whether or not it's a good idea to have plants in the bedroom. Yes, it is. To explain, let's go back to high school science. During photosynthesis, plants absorb carbon dioxide and give out oxygen. At night, when there is no sunlight to fuel this process, it reverses. Oxygen is absorbed and carbon dioxide is emitted. However, plants use so little oxygen that there's really no need for concern. If you are still worried, opt for mother-in-law's tongue). Unlike most other plants, it emits oxygen at night. EVERY BEDROOM NEEDS A BIG PLANT

Floor space in a bedroom can sometimes be tight, but there are often large blank walls. The solution is a big plant – anywhere from two metres upwards will do. There are heaps of big plants to choose from, and you can use a plant stand to increase the height. Choose a plant that has a lot going on up top (the wider the better), but has a slim footprint. Ideally, you want to put it in a spot where it is out of the way. Next to the bed is a good option if you have the space. Just make sure you won't bump into it in the dark.

VARIETY

Strength in numbers is a strong statement. Closely related plant varieties, like different cactuses or succulents, can create an interesting and cohesive scene. MOOD

TEXTURE



Bathrooms

Bathrooms are generally the simplest room in a house and, to be honest, they can be a bit boring. Yet they're also one of the most used areas, so it pays to give them a little extra attention. As well as adding interest, plants can thrive in a bathroom. Unlike decor pieces that might suffer from the moist conditions, they love a bit of humidity.

Bathrooms are notoriously hard to decorate. You might have a cute stool, a beautiful towel or two and some designer soap, but what else can you add? There's often too much stark, blank space and too few interesting focus points. This is where plants come in. Even the smallest of plants can help soften the space, breathe some life into it and complete the scene.











SIZE

Bathrooms are usually small, but think of this as an opportunity rather than a problem, and get creative with greenery. Take a good hard look at your bathroom. Does it have a high ledge, a windowsill or a perfectly placed ceiling hook that you've never used? Elements like these can be used to display your plants. And don't forget accessories like hangers – they can be used to great effect in small spaces. Choose suitable plants, and remember that even one small plant can make a huge difference. Use neutral pots to keep the focus on the greenery and the details of the bathroom. Sticking to light

PLACEMENT


In small bathrooms, focus on making the most of all the spots where you can put plants. Hang air plants on the wall, fill windowsills with a mix of potted plants and place medium-sized plants on the floor to help break up the space. Think about how the plants will grow. If the space is limited, choose plants that grow vertically or will cascade down a wall rather than spreading out horizontally. Check the light conditions to make sure you are choosing plants that enjoy bright light or grow well in more shaded positions.



The key to styling your living room is to get to grips with its special features. Does it have period details, a wonderful neutral backdrop or plenty of open-plan space? Living rooms, especially when they are filled with great decor items like rugs and artworks, are an exciting opportunity to style with plants and create something magical.







PLANNING

Before you start styling your kitchen with plants, think about how you use the space and what you would like to achieve. Do you just want to add some touches of greenery or go all-out with a jungle theme? Consider your space and what will work well. If you want to use large, spreading plants, you'll need enough space for them to grow horizontally. If you've only got room on a bench or table, look for plants that are suited to that. Identify the places where plants could sit, without necessarily changing the overall look of the room too much. The goal is to complement rather than overwhelm.



PLACEMENT

Big kitchen benches or islands can be functionally great when you're cooking but, when you aren't using them, they can look barren and boring. Try adding a plant with height to give the bench a focal point. Make sure it's easy to move when you need to use the space again.

Large enclosed terrariums also work well. They are low-maintenance, self-watering, and the wooden ones won't scratch delicate marble or stone benchtops when you move them. There are lots of great small businesses making terrariums these days or, if you're creatively inclined, you can have a go at making one yourself. There's plenty of advice to be found online or in books.

If you are a keen cook, a bright spot like a windowsill is the perfect place for potted herbs. They will grow well and be easily accessible when you are cooking.
